SUPERINTENDENT UPDATE:

District Lock Down and "The Boot"

On Wednesday, November 1st, Hesperia Community Schools chose to lockdown because of a bomb threat made by a middle school student while in the middle/high school cafeteria. During this time we worked collaboratively with law enforcement to make sure the district was safe and free of explosive devices. Although this disrupts many things, our children's safety is paramount!



Parents asked after the lockdown why we did not evacuate the buildings? This is an excellent inquiry as protocols of the past would have definitely pushed students to go home. Contrary to that practice, is new research indicating that having students stay in their classrooms is by far safer practice. Parents should also be aware that once Law Enforcement has entered our buildings, they are in control of making the decision for evacuation. In the world of social media, people expect play by play information; however, our first and foremost action is securing the safety of children.

In August, our School Safety team met with Abby Watkins, Newaygo Emergency Services Director to review safety protocols and procedures. This meeting supported the process of developing new emergency guidelines for the district. This team will meet again at the first of the year to further develop procedures when the new Boot/lighting system is fully operational.

When classrooms went into lockdown mode, they utilized the boot system. This metal two pronged plate was placed into every door. When hooked up to the lighting system, any person moving the boot into position will cause red blinking lights to move through the district telling others to lockdown as well. This allows for a lockdown protocol without having to announce it over the P.A. In addition, law enforcement is contacted through the lockdown system and know instantly the location of where the first boot was pulled. Once this system is fully hooked up, we will have an open house to explain this state of the art safety system to parents. Hesperia is proud to be the very first public school to receive this type of safety system.

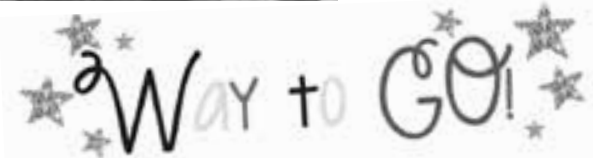

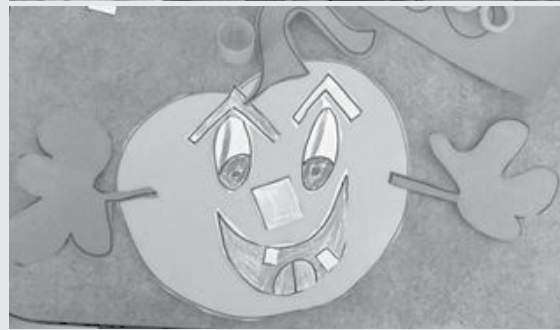
For the Ferris Trip:

In October some of the middle schoolers went to Artprize in Grand Rapids. We would like to thank TrueNorth and the friends who helped fund this trip.

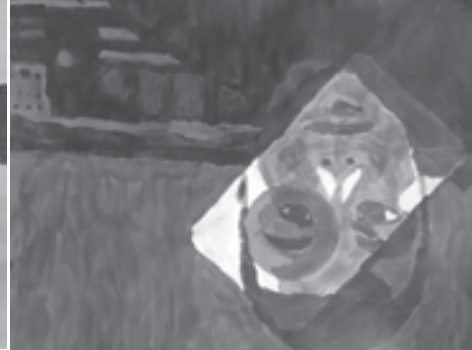

HESPERIA COMMUNITY SCHOOLS ACT TO SAVE TAXPAYER MONEY

Hesperia Community Schools once again seized an opportunity to reduce the District's interest expense by \$675,000 for taxpayers. This occurred through lowering debt payments over the next 21 years for bonds issued for the 2009 building renovations. The 2009 bonds maturing in the years 2020 through 2038 having a 4.8% interest rate were replaced with new funding bonds with the same bond term at an interest rate of 2.66%. Additionally, it is estimated that the refunding will reduce the District's dependence on the Michigan School Loan Revolving Fund in the future avoiding the estimated \$370,000 of additional interest expense. This is great news for district tax payers as they are projected to save \$1 million dollars over the life of the bonds.
